He has published at least 13 journal articles and has presented at more than 40 national and international conferences. Additionally, he has helped countless clinicians share their knowledge and skills by encouraging and

assisting them to present, locally and beyond, at meetings, on expert panels and at conferences; to publish case studies, consensus papers, journal articles and more.
